課程概述 Course Description

This course is for graduate students. It focuses on Shakespeare's use and abuse of history and the subsequent adaptations, revisions and concisions, of his plays in a variety of media. It seeks to combine the best of textual and theoretical scholarship in order to define Shakespeare's understanding of the relationship between story and history while contributing to the field of Adaptation.

Through an engagement with Shakespeare's texts and contexts, students will be able to assess the extent to which Shakespeare appropriated and adapted existing materials for his own purposes, and was in turn appropriated. By the end of the course students will also have a thorough understanding of the issues involved in adaptation.
