課程大綱內容 (含課程概述、教學目標、每週進度及教學內容簡述) Course outlines	一、課程概述 Course Description PARTICIPANTS The Short Courses are open for MA and advanced undergraduate students in political science and other social science disciplines. The maximum number of participants is 20. TEACHING FORMAT The Short Courses comprise an intensive programme of lectures by leading scholars in the field. The teaching language will be English. The Short Courses contain 5 teaching days, each of which is organised around an important topic in political parties and elections in Taiwan and East Asian democracies: ●Cleavages and identity politics in party systems and elections						

- Electoral reform and outcomes
- Money in party politics and elections
- Crisis of representative democracy and the populist surge
- Party systems and democratic performance

The first two hours consist of a lecture by two faculty members who organize the Short Courses. The last, third hour consists of student participations led by the faculty members.

The Short Courses are directed by Dr Fernando Casal Bértoa (Associate Professor, co-Director of the Research Centre for the Study of Parties and Democracy (REPRESENT), member of OSCE/ODIHR “Core Group of Political Party Experts”, and co-editor of the Routledge Book Series on Political Parties and Party Systems) and Dr Don Lee (Assistant Professor and Leverhulme Trust Fellow, Research Theme co-Director of the Nottingham Interdisciplinary Centre for Economy and Politics Research).

The main aims of the Short Courses include to:

- Have a broad knowledge of the different dimensions of party politics and elections
- Distinguish between different cleavage structures, electoral systems, party funding regimes, etc.
- Understand the role played by different institutional and sociological arrangements on the stabilization of party politics in new democracies
- Be able to evaluate what are the consequences of party system stability and functioning of democracy
- Acquire insightful knowledge on the way party systems have evolved in Taiwan and the East Asian region
- Be informed about the latest developments in electoral politics in the East Asian region
